In fact it came to my attention this morning when I helped an Amazon delivery guy get into my apartment building. He looked like a Nigerian and clearly was still learning English. But sure enough, as we parted he said "thanks SO much".

Has anyone else noticed the slide towards extreme expressions of gratitude?! It's like the reality of the state of the world is SO awful that there is a need to grease the wheels of social interaction.
